Education Perfect Trial – Term 4

In Term 4, Boyup Brook DHS Years 7-10 will be trialling **Education Perfect**, an online learning platform designed to support both teachers and students.

Education Perfect provides engaging and interactive resources across the four MESH subjects (Mathematics, English, Science and Humanities). The platform offers students opportunities to consolidate their learning, practise skills, and extend their knowledge in a flexible, digital format. Teachers can also use Education Perfect to deliver targeted activities and monitor student progress in real time.

We look forward to exploring how this program can enhance classroom learning and provide additional support for our students. Feedback from staff and students during the trial will help inform future decisions about its use at our school.

We're incredibly proud of our students for their enthusiasm, hard work, and engagement across so many areas this term. As we approach the end of week 10, we look forward to continuing the momentum with more learning, connection, and community engagement in Term 4.

Important: New Attendance SMS System – Compass

Important: New Attendance SMS System - Compass

Boyup Brook District High School is moving to a new system called Compass, which will manage all student attendance records. From Wednesday 17 September 2025, all attendance SMS messages will be sent from a new contact name: **boyupbrookdhs**.

What This Means for Parents, Guardians and Caregivers

If your child is marked absent or late without an explanation, you will receive an SMS on your mobile phone from **boyupbrookdhs**. The SMS will include a one-time link that allows you to provide the reason for your child's absence. The link will only be valid for 48 hours. Please do not reply to the SMS directly—the school will not receive it. Responses must be submitted through the link. Make sure your phone has mobile data or Wi-Fi to open the link.

Important Actions

Delete the old absentee SMS number from your phone. **Do not use it to contact the school after Tuesday 16 September 2025**. If your child is absent again without explanation, you will receive a new one-time link. If you do not use the link, you can still notify the school of your child's absence by phone (9765 0000) or email.


























High School Technologies

At the end of 2024, Boyup Brook DHS applied for and received a grant of around \$6000 from the Australian Defence Force to cover the purchase and training of staff in the ever-emerging field of Drone technology. The school has purchased 7 small DJI Neo drones and 1 medium sized DJI AIR 3, all of which are examples of the latest technology in regard to autonomous and remotely piloted aircraft and have great camera resolution. Before flying the drones, students in Year 7 and 8 STEM classes have completed a range of activities covering topics including Aeronautical Rules and regulations, Aeronautical safety and

regulations, responsibility and the ethical uses of such technology, and basic drone controls and operations.

The small Neo drones can be operated in autonomous mode, where they can be programmed to follow a subject, circle the person, or several other modes including rocket and boomerang, to provide some interesting video footage. They can also be controlled from a mobile phone or a handheld controller. Students have painted the 7 Neos, and even named some, so they can be identified when completing activities such as races and set circuit flying.


The larger AIR3 drone has so far been used to capture overhead footage of the newly cleared farm area above the High school and to take some aerial footage of the school for promotional purposes. Future plans include the filming of school events such as the athletics carnival and accurate mapping of the school grounds.

This program is intended to give students in introduction into the fast-developing field of drones which are being used in areas such as Mining, Agriculture, Delivery services, Photography and videography, Emergency response, Infrastructure inspection (buildings and bridges), Law enforcement and security, Scientific research, Entertainment and sports and the Military and Defence. This will hopefully open many employment opportunities for our student in the future.














Primary School Farm Skills

The school farm has had an incredibly productive and rewarding term, with contributions from students right across the school as well as parents and community members. It has truly been a team effort, and the progress we've made together is worth celebrating.

Student Contributions

Primary students have been busily involved in looking after the vegetable gardens, planting seasonal crops, drainage and learning the basics on farm safety as well as help preparing for the upcoming fire season. Their enthusiasm and energy have made a real difference in keeping the gardens weeded, watered, and thriving.

High school students have taken on more complex projects, including marking out Fencing, orchard design, planting and maintenance, and fire-preparation work around the sheds and paddocks. They've also been developing practical skills in areas such as machinery operation, tool use, sustainable farming practice and solving numerous drainage issues the rains have given us. These experiences not only benefit the farm but also build valuable lifelong skills.

Lap-a-thon Success




Thanks to the generosity of our school community, the Lap-a-thon raised just over \$4000 – a truly special contribution to support seriously ill children and their families.

Congratulations to our Student Councillors for their leadership and organisation, and thank you to everyone who supported this wonderful cause!
















P&C Update - Can You Lend a Hand?




